David Willis- Daisies April — August 2016

After earning a BA in Social Change from U.C. Berkeley in 1992, with a minor in Conservation and Resources Studies, Willis began working with glass in 1994.

Beginning with an apprenticeship under flameworker Bob Snodgrass, Willis went on to study with and work as a teaching assistant for Roger Parramore. He attended Pilchuck Glass School from 1997-2005 as a student, teaching assistant, and flameworking studio coordinator.

Willis's work is included in public, private, and museum collections nationally and internationally. He has been an instructor of flameworking at locations including the Pilchuck Glass School, the Corning Museum of Glass, Penland School of Crafts, and the Niijima Glass Art Festival, in Niijima, Japan. Addressing the complex, and simple, relationships between people and nature, on individual, personal, and societal levels.

Willis uses glass in a cross-disciplinary manner. His body of work includes, and often combines, flameworking, hot blowing and sculpting, large-scale sculpture, botanical models, mixed media, cold assembly, and installation art.

Represented by Austin Art Projects in Palm Desert, CA, Willis lives and works in Portland, Oregon, with his wife and their dogs.

Healing In Flames

In 2013 Museum of Glass piloted a new program called Hot Shop Heroes: Healing with Fire. Led by glass instructors, soldiers from Joint Base Lewis-McChord's Warrior Transition Battalion learned about glass through hands-on experiences. This exhibition will display work made by soldiers in their classes during Spring and Summer 2015. The display will celebrate the accomplishments of these soldiers, and will provide information about the importance of art in therapy and healing.

Most of the soldiers and veterans who have contributed to the creation of Healing In Flames served in Iraq or Afghanistan at least once; many have served multiple tours of duty. This exhibition gives voice to their personal and shared experience while being deployed. The experience of creating this exhibition has enabled the soldiers and veterans to explore their shared experience and their personal feelings about war, military life, and cultural differences by creating works that represent their most profound memories. Additionally, the exhibition will highlight a few pieces that are more lighthearted and are representational of the basic glass working skills acquired during their participation in the program.

Flora C. Mace and Joey Kirkpatrick: Every Soil Bears Not Everything

The Studio Glass movement accelerated in the 1970s at Pilchuck Glass School in Stanwood, Washington. This pivotal time in the cultural history of the Pacific Northwest has reverberated throughout the international art world. The innovations of Dale Chihuly, William Morris, and Lino Tagliapietra, key figures in this field, have been extensively examined. The collaborative team of Joey Kirkpatrick and Flora C. Mace are also pioneers of early contemporary glass and were close colleagues of Chihuly and Morris, often trading skills to develop signature works. Despite their prominence alongside other major glass artists, Kirkpatrick and Mace have not been afforded a review of their careers, which now span thirty-six years. This retrospective exhibition will highlight their prolific body of work.



Kirkpatrick and Mace began their collaboration at Pilchuck Glass School in 1979. Their first series evolved out of Mace's desire to devise a methodology of incorporating Kirkpatrick's delicate line drawings on paper as surface design onto blown cylinders. Kirkpatrick made elaborate "drawings" in bent wire that were colored in with glass cane. These drawings were then "picked up" onto the vessel in the hot shop. The process was groundbreaking in its innovation.

Throughout these artists' productive careers, Kirkpatrick and Mace have consistently explored seminal themes: principles of "drawing" as incorporated into glass, the metaphoric content of human's relationship to nature, and the appropriation of materials to support a visual idea. This exhibition will bring the depth and richness of these foci into a comprehensive overview of their careers.
